For the first time in three years, the Gathering of Nations Pow Wow was an in-person event, bringing together thousands of dancers, singers, artisans and families from across Indigenous North America.

Lexie James, 2019-2021 Miss Native America USA, from the Village of Tewa in First Mesa, and a member of the Hopi Tribe, was a contestant in the Miss Indian World pageant.

Tashina Red Hawk, 18, from the Sicangu Lakota tribe of Rosebud, South Dakota won the title and was crowned the new

Miss Indian World. There were 22 contestants from around the USA and Canada.

Red Hawk will serve as an ambassador for Indigenous nations throughout the USA and Canada.

The Miss Indian World Pageant is the largest & Most Prestigious Cultural Title for Young Native, Indigenous Women (18-25 years old). Miss Indian World is a Cultural Goodwill Ambassador to all cultures presenting and representing Native American, Indigenous & First Nations Tribal Culture.

The Pageant is a week-long exchange of ideas, traditions and good-will among the young women vying for the title of Miss Indian World. Miss Indian World is crowned at the Gathering of Nations Powwow in Albuquerque, New Mexico, USA.

The momngwit of First Mesa Consolidated Villages congratulates Ms. James on her leadership and as an ambassador of the Hopi Tribe and encourages all young people to seek the highest goals for yourselves and your people.

On March 13, 2022, the Hopi Tribe lost a man who was well known throughout the Tribe and in the neighboring towns. Not only was he a great teacher, but he was also a role model to the younger generations.

Nathaniel, also known as "Wings," was from the village of Sipaulovi and from the Sun Forehead Clan.

He worked as an Emergency Medical Technician for the past 40 years with the Hopi Tribe Emergency Medical Services and several years with the Navajo Tribe Emergency Medical Services. After he retired from the Hopi Tribe EMS, he went to work for Second Mesa Day School for two years and retired in June 2021. He took full pride in his career taking care of the people and had a great personality.

Everyone knew Nathaniel Quotshinma as "Wings" and he loved riding his Harley motorcycle, enjoyed music and

playing with his band, "Sunfire." Most importantly, he will be missed by his Kiva members for his dedication, respect and commitment and members of the Tribe.

Wings is survived by his spouse Ruby, son Alton, daughter Nathania, six grandchildren, two great-grandchildren and one on the way (which he looked forward to). He is also survived by one sister, Nadine Lomawunu and two brothers Elroy Navasie and Eldon Kalemsa Jr. and many nieces and nephews.

As a community, we need to remind ourselves of this month, May, is remembering our mothers and a month for family gatherings to celebrate the accomplishments of education at all levels.

First, our traditional teachings have always been to respect our women, young and old. For it is our women who bore the pains of our birth, and we are forever bound to them. Among this is our inherited right to be Hopi, born into her clan and member of her village. Our mothers and paternal grandmother took us out to greet and to be presented to the sun soon after birth. Thereafter, our mother cared for us and is a forever having responsibility for our care in according to our traditional and religious customs. The least we can do is to always honor and respect our mothers. Today, some of us long for our mothers who have journeyed to the next world. But their memories and teachings will always remain. I say today as a community, let us all thank our mothers for their loving teachings and caring for us. Let us remember the kind words of our mothers to always have the respect for each other and all people.

Our Traditional Leaders will always hold to our religious teachings to always respect our female members which especially includes our children. Our leaders must hold to their true responsibilities and authorizes vested in their Sacred Tiponis. By this commitment, our Religious Leaders have declared years ago that the future of our people is through education. The foreign dominance of the federal government is to assimilate our way of life that we maintained since time immemorial. Being educated, our children with our traditional teachings will be the protectors of our people and religion. It is with these commitments, in 1987, we dedicated our first Hopi Jr./Sr. High School on our reservation. I was honored to be the Chairman at this dedication and honored to witness its first graduating class. I saw the pride and the hopes of all our people during this historical happening.

Our leaders also had a strong belief that our children must always be at home to receive the loving care of parents. It was for these reasons, our leaders dedicated over eight hundred acres (800) of First Mesa land for the educational needs of our children.

Today, we see this same pride and support in our children in Head Start's school events. Of concern today is, why does this parental support appear to lessen in the years of our children's schooling? This is especially noticeable at the Junior and Senior High School years. Instead of our self-evaluations, we tend to blame others, especially our teachers, school administrators and school boards. It is not too late to rebuild back this vital support of our children's education and the schools that serve them.

We must all be accountable and responsible for the gradual loss of our language, customs, religion and the true respect for each other. It is never too late for us to recommit ourselves pride as the first people in this country. Let our short falls be the true beginnings for a generation of harmony to continue respect to protect our mothers and children. Let this also be the beginning of telling our mothers and children our lifetime of love imbedded in forgiveness.

This month we are celebrating promotion, graduations from our high schools and colleges. These are all earned accomplishments of our students that must include their parents and grandparents. On behalf of First Mesa Consolidated Villages and our Kikmongwi and Religious Leaders, Congratulations and that education must continue and forever be the way to pursue our dreams.

One of our Presidents famous words, "Ask not what your country can do for you, ask what you can do for your country". I close by saying, "Ask not what your educators and schools can do, but let's ask each other, what can we do to support our children and their school.

## Open Letter to Tribal Council to Immediately Address Hopi Law Enforcement Services

Dear Hopi Tribal Council Members,

I respectfully request this letter be read into record immediately to address the matter of the Hopi Law Enforcement Services.

On April 15, 2022 the Hopi Tribal Council (HTC) was given a preliminary out brief by the Office of Justice Services on an evaluation of the Hopi Law Enforcement's Services.

The out brief officially brought to light many issues HTC had spoken to since the Tribe contracted Law Enforcement from the Federal Government.

Several issues are extremely important and require immediate action

by the HTC. The most important is the lack of certified officers to enforce the law on Hopi. Having no certified officers puts Hopi Citizens at risk along with the Tribal Government.

I request the HTC have a discussion in executive session as soon as possible and take immediate action to deal with this situation.

I feel it is the Hopi Tribal government and Hopi Citizen's interest to discuss and possibly take action.

Effective Thursday, May 5, at 8am, Stage 1 fire restrictions went into place on State Trust Land within the following counties: Apache, Coconino - south of the Grand Canyon, Gila, Graham, Greenlee, La Paz, Maricopa, Mohave, Navajo, Yavapai, and Yuma Counties.

Under S1, campfires are only allowed in designated and developed campsites and smoking is prohibited

outside. Target shooting and fireworks are not allowed on State Trust Land at any time of the year.

In conjunction with restrictions, AZ Forestry prevention officers will begin patrols in high risk areas - including along I-17, the US 60 from the Lake Pleasant-area east into Pinal County and along the I-10.

## Hopi Tribal Council Investment Oversight, Gaming and Transportation Task Team Reports

### HOPI TRIBAL COUNCIL

\* Executive Order #011-2021 (Range Mitigation and Livestock Reduction). Item has been tabled for the reasons that the Department of Natural Resources continues to meet with livestock owners and associations.

\* Interview for position on the Hopi Tribal Housing Authority Board of Commissioners. Cathy Wright has been appointed to the HTHA Board of Commissioners.

\* Appointment of Nicole Johnson to the Hopi Tribe Economic Development Corporation's Board of Directors was approved by Hopi Tribal Council.

\* Matter of Hopi Tribal Council meetings being aired by KUYI. The issue was discussed and delegated to the Rules of Order task team to address. Thus far, there is no formal agreement or contract with any mass media to broadcast Hopi Tribal Council meetings. A letter later came forward from the the Rules of Order indicating that media would not be allowed on the Zoom link until an analysis of media use is complete.

### INVESTMENT OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE (IOC)

\* CEO Cindy Smiley is open and welcome to the IOC visiting the Hopi Tribe Economic Development Corporation (HTEDC) office in Flagstaff for review of financial documents per Hopi Tribal Resolution.

\* Moenkopi Development Corporation is working on a payment proposal to present to the IOC. The IOC will await the proposal before moving forward.

\* The Walpi Housing Management Agreement meetings continue and has a goal of completion in the next few months. A final proposal of the management agreement will be presented to the HTEDC and results of the discussions reported to the IOC and to the Hopi Tribal Council for approval or disapproval.

### GAMING COMMITTEE:

\* Meeting with Tonto Apache regarding a proposed partnership to bring a casino to Winslow, Az., has been set for April 29, 2022 in Payson, Az. Gaming Chairman W. Youvella, Jr. of First Mesa Consolidated Villages attended and proposed and scheduled a secondary meeting in Winslow, Az., with Tonto Leadership and the Winslow Mayor, on May 9, 2022.

\* A report on the May 9, 2022, involving the Gaming Committee, Mayor of Winslow, and Tonto Apache Chairman Johnson and team will be forthcoming.

### TRANSPORTATION TASK TEAM (TTT):

\* Project N8031, road from Pinon, Az., to Hard Rock, Az., was discussed and a proposal was brought forward by Vice-Chair W. Youvella, Jr. Since this is a partnership, it is logical that Navajo would be open to allowing for Hopis to have the opportunity to be employed with the project. A letter to Navajo will be forthcoming requesting Hopis be given the opportunity for employment.

\* Route 47 in the Spider Mound area, is proposed to be on the Hopi Department of Transportation's inventory. The matter will be presented to Hopi Tribal Council for approval in May.

\* An Interest Bearing Account for HDOT funds is being revisited by Vice-Chair W. Youvella, Jr. and Treasurer Nada Talayumptewa.

\* Discussion regarding a proposed finance/procurement position within the HDOT office has been assigned to Vice-Chair W. Youvella, Jr., to meet with Finance Director Jim Davis and Asst. Finance Director Anthony Laban.

\* Discussion about the flooding occurring and affecting the road infrastructure will include the villages. The Army Corps of Engineers will be requested to assist.

\* Due to the continued supply chain challenges and inflation that has been rising for a year, the Bacavi road project has been put on hold indefinitely. It is hoped that this project will not be on hold for too long, however this unfortunate situation also affects all other projects, backing up their projected start dates.

## Musangnuvi Concerns and Update

It has been over a month since we attempted to move village issues and concerns before the Musangnuvi Village Board of Directors (MVBOD) for action. It began with the decertification of Council Representatives Delores Coochamptewa and Pansy Edmo. Archie Duwahoyeoma appeared before the Hopi Tribal Council on April 07, 2022 to restate his position as the Village leader of Musangnuvi and to request that the two representatives be reinstated. We are yet to understand what transpired with a motion by Phillip Quochytewa that was objected to by the Vice Chairman before a second to the motion could be made. We will just have to tune in to KUYI to see if this agenda item is continued.

In the meantime, we still have village matters such as funding, expenditures, projects, board meeting minutes, etc., that are public information that need to be openly shared with the Musangnuvi people. Our Council Representatives have been accused of "neglect of duty," but we have not considered our own MVBOD guilty of the same charges. Referring to the By-Laws that govern our MVBOD, Article II Purpose: "The Board's major responsibilities shall be to serve the needs of the Village members in accomplishing their goals and objectives." What are our village's goals and objectives? Do we know who, when, and where those goals and objectives were planned and approved? If there were goals and objectives, why was so much CARES funding returned? The diligent upkeep of documentation, such as village meeting minutes, and availability to the public is another issue of concern.

This questioning and evaluating of our village growth since the old days of Revenue Sharing Funds is an effort to get you, the Musangnuvi people, to take a stand on behalf of our village. This may be the last year for funding from the Hopi Tribe and we need to help decide how the funds are going to be used. According to Mr. Merwin Kooyahoema's announcement in Tribal chambers on April 07, 2022, Musangnuvi will be holding elections in

May. Can an election occur when the current terms of the Council Representatives and MVBOD has not expired? Are we talking about an election for Tribal Council Representatives, MVBOD, or both? This is a call to you to start thinking of individuals who can make a positive difference for our community of Musangnuvi. If the election happens in May, step forward with your nominations and votes. Let's stop basing important village decisions on a meeting of 12 or 14 attendees. There are over 500 registered members of Musangnuvi village.

I know how hard it is to deliver notices to the Musangnuvi villagers because of the distant localities they have gone from the village proper. However, we have suggested other means that can be used to keep everyone abreast of village happenings such as zoom, Facebook and newsletters. We continuously say the villagers don't attend the village meetings, but how much true effort has been extended to them to have that happen?

#### Miscellaneous Addendums:

1. Land Assignment Documents: Archie Duwahoyeoma reminds you that any land assignments must first have concurrence of your clan uncles and elders before he can provide his signature. Please be aware that your documents should have an appropriate signature line for village leader. He cannot sign as a Board Member, Clan Member, or Landowner.
2. Musangnuvi Village Board and Village meetings: The Musangnuvi Village By-Laws clearly set the last Monday of each month for Musangnuvi Village Board Meetings and the last Tuesday for Village meetings. Have you been notified of these two events for April 2022? Did these meetings transpire as provided by the Musangnuvi Village By-Laws?
3. Musangnuvi Village Administration Services: It is not clear if services are available to the Musangnuvi villagers on a daily basis. There needs to be a schedule of business hours daily for villager's reference.

## Tutskwat Oqawtoynani 2022 Earth Day Clean Up

64 volunteers gathered in the wind to clean an estimated 2.75 tons of trash on Tutskwat Oqawtoynani's 2022 April Earth Day Cleanup. Two half day cleanups were done, Friday April 22nd, recleaning behind, below Tewa Village, and on Saturday, April 23rd moving from Tewa Village towards Sichomovi Village on the back side of the mesa. Our community village cleanups started in 2016. It took us 6 years to clean the back side of Tewa Village only. This speaks to the enormity of trash that has been removed from behind, below Tewa Village. Keep in mind that we have not even cleaned the front side of Tewa yet.

Vital partnerships have been created with our awesome community members, First Mesa Villages, national, local and border town businesses, tribal programs, as well as our Traditional Leadership here at First Mesa.

For the April Earth Day Cleanup, we received help from CellularOne and Hopi Telecommunications Inc., to feed our volunteers. There were donations of food and drinks from Tara Pablo, Candice Ami, Kareesa Mahle, Loretta

Nuvayestewa, Sichomovi Village, Elise Lomawaima, Leah Whitman James, First Mesa Baptist Church, Pastor Park, and Lori Nuvayestewa. Walpi Village, CSA, Alan Chavez and their security staff helped us with traffic flow and parking and allowed us to feed our volunteers on Saturday at Itaaki Bathhouse. We also were surprised, yet happy to hear when we went to dump the 150 bags of trash at the Hopi Solid Waste Landfill, Danford Wadsworth, Director of the Hopi Solid Waste Program, informed us that we did not have to pay any fees for the trash we brought. New partners that provided funding for our project this year is Colorado Plateau Foundation, Justice Outside and Northern Arizona Climate Change Alliance. We hope to make more connections as we are looking at another 8-10 years of cleaning to completely clear all the trash top to bottom from First Mesa.

One of the highlights this year was seeing the land returning to its healthy state in the areas we first started our clean-up back in 2016. We had originally intended to go back and reseed these areas where the layers of trash were removed so we could bring back the grasses and natural plants, but we now know that once the land is cleaned, it can and will heal itself and we are seeing the plants and grasses

returning on their own because the land can breathe once again in those areas that were once covered with trash. This is a huge victory within itself as we know that the health of our environment directly affects the health of the people who live there.

The layers of trash that we see, like peeling back the layers of an onion, can be likened to the healing of our people in that there are layers of hurt, pain, grief, and sorrow, that we all carry within, layers that must be peeled back to move forward in a positive, healthy direction in our lives. We have experienced so much loss and pain over the past two years on the Hopi Nation and are all in different stages of healing. So, we must begin, again, to do

the hard work of clearing the layers of “trash “on our lands and in our lives. Once we begin moving to action, we will begin to see new growth in all areas of our lives. Tutskwat Oqawtoynani 2022 Earth Day Clean Up.

We will see, springing forth, the return of hope, happiness, and a sincere caring for ourselves, and others. We will then, in all honesty and humbleness, truly be able to call ourselves Hopi, Stewards of the Land, Caretakers of this World!

Miss Rabbit said, “Mr. Eagle tells you how you need to play and have fun and keep your body moving. You would not be able to do that if you did not have Mother Earth to walk upon. That is a gift.

Walking and running on Mother Earth helps keep your spirit strong.” Then the rabbit hopped over to a flower that was growing by the children. “You see this flower?” she said. The children nodded their heads. “This flower is also a gift from Mother Earth. She grows flowers of many colors for you to enjoy.”

“What else does she give you?” Miss Rabbit asked. The children looked around and saw the trees and the grass. “I guess she gives us things that grow,” said Rain That Dances.

The rabbit jumped and said, “You are right, Rain That Dances. She also gives us food to eat and water that helps the food to grow. I want to tell you about these foods now.”

“What do you think I eat?” asked Miss Rabbit.

Rain That Dances said, “I know. You eat grass.” Simon smiled and said, “You eat carrots. I have seen you in my grandmother’s garden eating the carrots.” Little Hummingbird added, “I have seen you in the garden, too.”

The rabbit laughed and said, “I guess I have eaten from many gardens in the village. I eat from the gardens because I want to stay healthy. I also like what grows in the gardens.”

Thunder Cloud made a face and said, “I will not eat things from the garden. Those are for rabbits.”

Miss Rabbit quickly hopped around and then stopped. She said, “The fruits and vegetables that grow in the gardens are food for you to eat, too. They are very good for all of us.”

“Let’s think of what is in the garden,” Miss Rabbit said. “What is growing there?”

With his head down, Thunder Cloud said in a whisper, “I eat some fruits, but I do not like vegetables. And I do not eat vegetables that grow in the garden. ## Second Booster Available for Older Individuals and Certain Immunocompromised Individuals

Below are the eligibility requirements to receive the 2nd booster dose:

- A second booster dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine or Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine may be administered to individuals 50 years of age and older at least 4 months after receipt of a first booster dose of any authorized or approved COVID-19 vaccine.
- A second booster dose of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine may be administered to individuals 12 years of age and older with certain kinds of immunocompromise at least 4 months after receipt of a first booster dose of any authorized or approved COVID-19 vaccine. These are people who have undergone solid organ transplantation, or who are living with conditions that are considered to have an equivalent level of immunocompromise.
- A second booster dose of the Moderna COVID-19 Vaccine may be administered at least 4 months after the first booster dose of any authorized or approved COVID-19 vaccine to individuals 18 years of age and older with the same certain kinds of immunocompromise.
