Hopi Arsenic Mitigation Project

A letter was sent to the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) notifying them of First Mesa Consolidated Villages' (FMCV) non-acceptance of the Water Agreement and also reporting the nonapproval of our village land use for the Hopi Arsenic Mitigation Project (HAMP). First Mesa's Kikmongwi not approving the use of our village, is a major infraction of our village authority over lands.

The letter to EPA in part states "the authority over our lands is resulting from a sacred compact at the time of our migrations and our ancestors' occupation of our village. The inheritance of the sacred bundles (Tiponi) was only after the promise to become stewards of the creator's land. The nonapproval for the use of First Mesa lands is a major infraction of this instruction and promise."

At the onset of the HAMP grant from EPA and the Indian Health Service, letters were sent to FMCV requiring land use approvals. None of these requirements were ever granted and have not been satisfied by the Hopi Tribe. Upon inquiry, FMCV leaders were told the Hopi Tribal Council did not need FMCV's land approvals. Therefore, it must now be assumed that the Hopi Tribal Council has

June 2022 Hopi Tribal Council Report

Hopi Tribal Council:

• Action Item #050-2022: Requested Approval from Hopi Tribal Council on an Intergovernmental Agreement with the State of Arizona on the design, advertisement, award and to administer construction of pedestrian path and lighting along State Route 264.

This is the area around the Hopi Cultural Center to improve the safety of both pedestrian and vehicle traffic. The Flood Preparedness: Action Item was passed and construction should begin soon.

• Action Item #053-2022: To obtain Hopi Tribal Council consent for Hopi Telecommunications, Inc. (HTI) to make improvements on its Polacca and Second Mesa towers under leases H-18-78 and H -20-78 respectively, and to authorize HTI to enter into a colocation or other agreements with third parties as required to carry out the intent of the Resolution.

This Action Item is for the purposes of installing a FirstNet system for emergency communications. The Action Item was passed, however the Action Item #052-2022, addressing the towers at the Second Mesa Water Tower, Hopi Veteran's Memorial Center and Hopi Tribal Buildings was tabled to enable more communication with villages.

• Action Item #048-2022: Amend Resolution #H-044-2021, to accept "All" funding from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and funding for Coronavirus Relief Fund dollars as authorized by the act.

This Action was passed and is inclusive

of all funds that may be made available to the Hopi Tribe in the form of ARPA monies, which will allow for much quicker acceptance of said funds.

 More discussions have taken place regarding the FY 2023 General Fund Budget development. The process is ongoing with the goal of an approved budget prior to the end of FY 2022.

There have been numerous meetings regarding Flood Preparedness, especially within the areas of Polacca, Bacavi and Moencopi. The Hopi Department of Transportation (HDOT), along with the Hopi Tribal Council Transportation Task Team has been working on preparing for possible floods this monsoon season. Last year, HDOT responded as much as possible to emergencies in Polacca, Bacavi, Hotevilla and Moencopi due to flooding. Trying to avoid a repeat of last year, the HDOT Director, Mr. Michael Lomavaktewa was able to schedule a meeting with various agencies including, the US Army Corps of Engineers, FEMA, Navajo County, Arizona Dept. of Emergency and Military Affairs, Bureau of Indian Affairs, etc.

On June 2, 2022 began a series of meetings including various agencies to seek assistance and ways to mitigate the flooding issue and the meetings are ongoing. The most agreed upon short term solution is the implementation of Hesco Barriers along the Northwest edges of the Polacca Wash. This is an effort to protect lives, property (FMES), homes and infrastructure. The implementation of the Hesco Barriers will require an Archaeological Study of areas to be disturbed as well as the approval by clans of those areas for these temporary structures.

For the Polacca area, emails of updates and information have been sent to First Mesa Consolidated Villages, Walpi Village CSA, Sichomovi Village CSA, Tewa Board Chair and FMES Facilities. A meeting was held at FMES inviting all offices of the First Mesa area, also inviting the Hopi Tribal Housing Authority, Indian Health Services and Bureau of Indian Affairs. These meetings will need to continue as any plans to mitigate flooding in Polacca is going to need the assistance of the entire community.

It is noted that flood preparedness is not limited to the Polacca Wash area, but also areas affected by runoff from the mesa, falling rocks onto roadways due to heavy rainfall, high wind damage to homes, etc.

Recently, Mr. Ronald Honyumptewa, the Hopi Director of Public Safety has assumed the lead in working with villages in flood preparedness/mitigation efforts. Mr. Paul Saufkie of the Hopi Emergency Response Team is also involved with meetings and assisting with efforts and education. Contact information with all offices of the First Mesa area has been provided to Mr. Honyumptewa and it is hoped he will meet with village offices in Polacca in the near future.

Hopi Tribal Council,

I request the FY22 budget funding allocations for a State Lobbyist and HTC's Goals and Objectives work session be placed on the August 2022 agenda for discussion and possible action.

During the FY22 process the HTC added and agreed that both these Funding allocations were important to HTC success. Since then the funds have not been spent. A Goals and Objective Group/Team was identified and they are currently conducting Request for Proposal (RFP) to interested facilitators. It is important that the Group/ Team inform HTC if the allocated funds are sufficient and when they are expected to be spent.

HTC also allocated funds to hire a State Lobbyist and requires HTC to direct the process to proceed and begin the RFP process to spend the funds and begin the important work of representing Hopi's interest at the State level.

Investment Oversight Committee (6/13/22):

- Some years ago an Omnibus account was set up to have numerous accounts within this one account for easier record keeping however that has not proven to be productive for Hopi. The Tribal Treasurer was tasked with essentially reversing the various accounts out of the Omnibus Account. This has taken a considerable amount of time and assistance of the Investment Oversight Committee as well as our financial partners at Rockefeller. With a methodology that is fair and just, Treasurer Talayumptewa is now able to follow through with reinstating the various accounts as single accounts and not under the auspices of the Omnibus Account.
- A sub-committee has continued working with Moenkopi Developers Corporation and is prepared to present an option for MDC. The request for MDC to restructure its loan agreement has proven to be more difficult due to hospitality forecasts and the still ongoing Coronavirus Pandemic.
- An Action Item is forthcoming from the Hopi Tribe Economic Development Corporation to cease management operations of the Walpi Hous-With an impending decision, the subcommittee delegated with this duty will suspend talks until a decision is made by Hopi Tribal
- A revision of the Hopi Investment Policies is being addressed as these policies are over 5 years old and need to be updated.
- Discussion on the proposed Basalt Rebar project proved productive with an account from which to draw from to move forward with this manufacturing project. The necessary \$2.4 million would be drawn from the unallocated account, if approved by Hopi Tribal Council. Further vetting of this economic opportunity is being conducted by the IOC.
- IOC met with the HTEDC on 6/17/22 in a verv productive meeting. General HTEDC financial information was disclosed as well as discussions regarding revenue generation for the Hopi Tribe.

It was agreed upon that these meetings take place \diamond The Gaming Committee is aware of previous refat least twice a year. At the next meeting, more in depth financial information may be asked of HTEDC as well as dialogue regarding HTEDC's ability to assist Hopi in other economic endeavors.

The IOC will be making a report to Hopi Tribal Council in July.

Gaming Committee (6/13/22):

- The gaming committee is preparing to present two Action Items to Hopi Tribal Council regarding a possible small casino on Hopi Trust Land near Winslow, Az. The first Action Item would include acceptance of a \$17 million dollar loan and a management agreement with Tonto Apache. The second Action Item will not include a loan, but will include a management agreement.
- The Gaming Committee will be making a report to Hopi Tribal Council in July.

• Notes:

- Should gaming be approved, a Board would be developed that is majority Hopi.
- No longer are there talks about multiple casinos and approvals needed by Tonto Apache, a potential agreement is only for the Winslow site and Hopi has control.
- ♦ A sprung or metal building is most likely the preferred type of casino structure.
- ♦ Health and Safety of patrons and the surrounding housing areas is taken into heavy consideration.
- ♦ A newly appointed Gaming Commission would be separate from Hopi Tribal Council.
- Bear River Casino in California has used Tonto Apache in this same manner to establish their casino.
- ♦ All revenue and its intent, goes through stringent approvals.
- ♦ The loan structure is for a period of seven (7) years.
- There was a 2021 survey, conducted by the previous committee that showed a majority of support for the casino as an economic endeavor.

- erendums conducted related to gaming as well as the 2021 survey.
- Memorandum of Agreements with the City of Winslow and Navajo Country, for all emergency services needs to be approved.
- Opening Proposed WinsOpening Proposed Winslow site.
- ♦ The plans at present are for a Casino only, however with the opportunity for expansion.
- ♦ The Gaming Committee met with the City of Winslow and there is much support for a proposed Hopi Casino.

Transportation Task Team (6/15/22):

- The development of a procurement/finance position within the Hopi Department of Transportation (HDOT) office is still being discussed with the Finance Department open to working with HDOT to possibly developing such a position.
- Placing of HDOT funds into an interest bearing account is ongoing and slated to be addressed at the July 2022 meeting. It is hoped that these funds can be put into such an account to gain yields that can expand the capabilities of HDOT.
- A Partnership meeting with the Arizona Department of Transportation will take place on July 20th.
- Route 10 road maintenance issues need to be routed to Mr. Carl King of the Hopi Utilities Corporation (HUC) through the end of July.
- As-Built plans for Route 10 are needed from HUC, prior to any new road construction.
- HDOT will continue to assist in any flood mitigation efforts throughout the Hopi Nation.
- Hwy 87, where the Polacca Wash feeds through a culvert will be addressed with ADOT. The present culvert is simply not adequate for the amount of water that flows through the Polacca Wash.
- Bus pullouts along Hwy 264 will be addressed with ADOT.



The HBE will provide consistency, educational leadership, and accountability for all seven Hopi Tribally Controlled Schools:

Hotevilla Bacavi Community School
Hopi Day School
Second Mesa Day School
First Mesa Elementary School
Keams Canyon Elementary School
Hopi Junior Senior High School

The transition to the unified Hopi School System is scheduled to occur in July 2023


