Part of the history of the Hopi Leaders has been the choice to seek education for our children's future to become the eyes, ears, and voices of our people. This was to prepare for the changes we would face at the progressiveness of the dominating society under the United States Government.

This along with retaining our language, culture and religion was determined to be our survival as special native people.

The challenge faced was to bring our own High School to our homeland. Until 1987, we were the only tribe in the United States that did not have a high school on

our homelands. All students completing Jr. High School had to leave the reservation to complete their high school education. This was a traumatic experience for students leaving the guidance of family and the cultural lifestyles of our people.

Villages question the Existence of First Mesa Consolidated Villages Office

Have you taken time to notice the greenery and growth of sunflowers across the Polacca wash, looking to the southeast, after our blessings of abundant rains? This all came although our religious ceremonies were performed only by our leaders, to protect the people from the COVID virus. The sunflowers as we know, are the religious ceremonial symbol of our Flute Clan under the leadership of our Kikmongwi. The rains are also looked to as blessings to wash away the virus and to begin the restoration of our daily Hopi ways of living, in harmony.

Recently, three of our village administrators called on the Chairman and Vice Chairman questioning the existence of the First Mesa Consolidated Villages (FMCV), the office of our traditional and religious leaders under our traditional self-government.

We are told that at the time of our migrations, various clans came to the creator living at the first ledge on the north side of the mesa. The acceptance by the creator of our clans, into his establishment and onto his lands, was the beginning of First Mesa. This first location was later moved to the mesa which became Walpi under the leadership of our Kikmongwi and all the religious leaders. We are told the move to the upper most of the mesa was due to marauding tribes coming onto our lands and the move was for protection.

This was the beginning of First Mesa Village under the self-government governance of our Kikmongwi along with the religious and ceremonial leaders. Our existence as Hopi people in what is now northeastern Arizona is referred to as the first settlement since "time immemorial." This was our village government until the predominant late comer's government, the United States of America, passed the infamous legislation entitled the 1934 Indian Reorganization Act. This required our people in respective villages to supposedly create a union of all villages by adopting a constitution. At the beginning, all villages objected to the creation of a constitution calling for the continuance of our self-government. The U.S. government detailed Oliver LaFarge to live among our people to create and convince the acceptance of the constitution.

Our village at first did not acceptance the creation of this so-called constitution but later realized the future with progressive influences it would create. We are told many discussions were held during this time which included the status of the

three established villages at first mesa. As we all should know, Walpi was the first created village with Kikmongwi as the leader. In later years, Sichomovi Village was established by Walpi leaders due to the over population of Walpi, Sichomovi (flower mound) had the Water/Corn Clan to assist the Kikmongwi to over see the village operations. In later years, the Hano people were summoned for protection and were awarded land at the east end of the mesa to establish their homes. The Hano people were later accepted into Walpi Village and became the As-wunqwa (Mustard Clan) under the Hopi Leadership. In later years, the descendants of the Tewa People migrated onto First Mesa lands and were allowed by Walpi Leadership to occupy the vacant Hano Village by special agreement. None of these established villages were established with a Kikmongwi and its own religious ceremonial practices which all continued to derive from Walpi. It was for this reason, the First Mesa leaders agreed to establish a consolidation of its villages under the leadership of the Kikmongwi.

This agreement as a consolidation was included into the adoption of the Constitution and By-laws of the Hopi Tribe which was approved by the United States Government after a referendum vote by majority Hopi people casting ballots. The constitution remains to state that the Hopi Tribe is a union of self-governing villages. Each village will decide to remain under the traditional self-government or change its village status under a village constitution. Today, Shungopavi and First Mesa remain under the self-government with Kikmongwi as its leader. First Mesa has representation on the Tribal Council while Shungopavi, acting on its rightful choice, does not participate in the Tribal Council.

The First Mesa traditional government was challenged in the 1980's by a group of villagers (Peoples Rights) wanting to create a village constitution. The Kikmongwi and religious leaders opposed this change and filed a motion in Tribal Courts under Hamilton vs Kavena. After referral from the Federal District Court to the Hopi Tribal Court, the Hopi Appellant Court ruled in favor of the religious leaders and placed a permanent injunction on any election. The Hopi Appellant Court also ruled on a "Certified Question" relating to direct village allocations to the three consolidated villages. The ruling first stipulated that the direct allocation did not violate

the constitution under the context that the Hopi Tribal Council governs its funds and can award any organization. However, in this ruling the Court stated that this did not create the villages receiving allocations to have village governance authority and did not take away the authorities of the Kikmongwi such as appointing Tribal Council Representatives. The tribal allocations were to work cooperatively to provide community services only.

The Hopi Tribal Council awarded its village allocations under established requirements such as village board of directors with policies. To receive the allocations, villages must adhere to certain process such as meetings, budget and board approvals with resolution. Our three villages remained as a consolidation with Kikmongwi as Leader. None of the three villages' policies and establishment of Village Boards were approved by the Traditional Leaders. The Hopi Tribal Council without reviewing the stipulations of the court's ruling, violated its constitution. This was predicted by our leaders due to the assimilation of our traditional and religious village government to create the Tribal Council as the dominating ruler of the Hopi Villages and people. The overthrow of our religious government will eliminate the sovereignty of Native People and reward the United States Government its long-time assimilation. As long as we practice our religion, culture and ceremonies under the leadership and authority of Religious Leaders, we maintain our sovereign rights. It will be at the hands of our own people that we will overthrow our traditional self-government.

Today, at the disguise of progress, our people are discussing to change our Hopi Constitution. The first change will be to eliminate our self-government under the leadership of our Kikmongwi, elimination of Hopi language as a requirement and eliminating the village land jurisdictions. Again, these are a part of the predictions of actions by our own people supported by the U.S. Government under tribal self-government. We have a forced government constitution because we never had a treaty with the government. Our leaders included in the constitution the Hopi language requirements, certification by Kikmongwi and having Tribal Official candidates to reside on the Hopi Reservation no less than two years prior to candidacy for office. Our village members are calling our village self-government an ancient system. It is understandable of their misun-

derstandings based on not being raised on the Hopi reservation. We have survived progress under the leadership of our traditional and religious leaders by providing our village lands to serve all our Hopi People.

A recent letter from our Religious Leaders was sent to the three village Administrators in First Mesa, inviting them to a meeting to present explanations of their letter recently sent to the Chairman and Vice Chairman. Their letter questioned the existence of the First Mesa Consolidated Villages Office, created by the Kikmongwi and the Traditional and Religious Leaders. It is evident that most people are not familiar with the Constitution and By-laws of the Hopi Tribe. Our leaders govern under the authority of their tiponi (sacred bundle) derived from the creator, which they must always honor. Our First Mesa (Walpi) traditional Leaders continue the religious practices which was brought during their Clan's migrations. It is different from other villages' leadership which is derived from being ordained into the Wutsim Ceremony. Example: Kikmongwi must be from the flute clan; Katsin Mongwi from Katchina Clan; Soyal Mongwi from Water/Corn Clan and so forth. These religious practices were brought by each respective Clans to Walpi Village.

All this religious and cultural history must be fully understood if we are to make a devastating change to our present village government. As Federal Judge Earl Carroll stated in his court to the *People's Rights* Group in 1987, "Can I ask why you want to change from your traditional government when it provided you survival as first peoples. Once you lose the traditional government, it will be lost forever, just like you can't put humpy dumpty back together again." Interesting that a non-Hopi understood and had respect for our traditional government.

The issues at our village are in the hands and authority of our leaders. The constitution remains as is and must be enforced by the Hopi Tribal Council and especially the Federal Government who approved this document. We are all survivors of the pandemic, but will our traditional self-government survive. Only the future holds to the reality of predictions of our past and present leaders.

In the meantime, we must continue to have reverence to our religion for blessing of continual rains. We are instructed to never let go of our planting sticks for it is the key to our survival.

Officials Meet to Discuss Road Damages to Low Mountain Road —Continued from Page 1

During the highlights of the Hopi Navajo land dispute in the 1970's, the U. S. Congress was considering legislation to divide the 1882 executive order land. Although this land was considered part of the Hopi Aboriginal lands, the Hopi Tribal Council faced a critical political decision to provide its support for the land dispute settlement. The Tribal Council directed former Chairman Abbott Sekaquaptewa to present the critical needs of the Hopi People. Included in the 1974 Hopi Navajo Settlement Act was for the Hopi Tribe to receive a High School and a Hospital. First Mesa Village approved the lands for the Hopi Jr. Sr. High School which opened in 1987 and the Hospital, now the Hopi Health Care Center, which opened in 2000.

The opening of the high school was a historical event which included the school reaching its maximum enrollment capacity. This was an accomplishment of our educators since funding for schools are

determined by the number of students. This created the transportation needs of students, which included the HPL areas. As a federally funded school, all native students would have to be allowed enrollment.

This was the beginning of the challenge to construct the BIA Route H60 (Low Mountain, Upper Polacca Road) as an all-weather road. The First Mesa Traditional and Religious Leadership had already approved the village lands to construct this road in the 1970's, almost 60 years ago. Today, this road remains not only a bus route for the Hopi Jr. Sr. High School, but also provides immediate access for Police, EMS, Fire, Health Care provider services and other human needs of the people.

The Hopi and Navajo Tribes have placed other priority needs of their reservations and allowed this road to become impassable, especially from the recent rainstorms. The current condition of the road has worsened and is no longer safe

for vehicle travel, especially during inclement weather conditions. With winter approaching, it will only create havoc for school and emergency needs. This road is only thirteen miles long with much of the area being Hopi land and remains the shortest route to State Highway 264, which is a public road system maintained by the state of Arizona.

The Navajo Chapters of Low Mountain and Pinon, joined by First Mesa Village have lobbied the Arizona State Legislature and received momentary assistance to jump start the construction. Our single most assistance comes from the Navajo County Board of Supervisors and our State Legislative Representatives such as Jasmine Blackwater-Nygren.

The single most holdup is the need for the Hopi Tribe to update the right-of-way which includes the design. Our First Mesa Leaders continue to question the status of the construction knowing the need of their people. Arizona State

Highway Board member and former Navajo County Board of Supervisor, Mr. Jesse Thompson remains to be a key supporter for the reality of H60 becoming an all-weather road.

Since the efforts of the Hopi and Navajo Tribes appear to be politically stalled, the grassroots people are now discussing alternatives to represent themselves for achieving funding for the construction.

On August 31, the First Mesa Consolidated Villages office received a telephone call from Navajo Tribal Council Delegate Kee Allen Begay, Jr. asking if the FMCV Administrator would meet with him and U.S. Department of Transportation Deputy Assistant Secretary for Tribal Affairs, Mr. Arlando Teller on BIA Route 60.

Upon a visit to the site, it was clear that much of the road was completely washed out and only passable by use of four-wheel drive vehicles. One Hopi Department of Transportation motor grader was observed working the

road on that day. The cost of maintenance for the past 60 years, must now meet the cost of construction of an all-weather road system.

It was agreed that the FMCV Administration will request approval from the First Mesa Traditional and Religious Leaders to join the Navajo Chapters to challenge our own efforts for direct funding for the road. Our leaders will never relinquish their authority over village lands and will hold true to their responsibility of all people being their children. This is also part of our village position to be proactive in being a self-government prior to and after the government's forced constitution upon us. Our local grassroots efforts will work on a plan on its approach with the United States Congress. In the interim, the twenty-four students coming from the Low Mountain, Pinon and Forest Lake areas will have to be bused daily via Burnside (Ganado) route. Emergencies will rely on prayers for achieving the needed help.

Council Delegate Kee Allen Begay, Jr. continues request for Hopi BIA Route 60 improvements

LOW MOUNTAIN, Ariz.— Hon. Council Delegate Kee Allen Begay, Jr. (Tachee/Blue Gap, Many Farms, Nazlini, Tselani/Cottonwood, Low Mountain) of the 24th Navajo Nation Council met with representatives from both the Hopi Tribe and the U.S. Department of Transportation to record first-hand accounts of the unimproved conditions of Hopi BIA Route (H60). Tribal leaders urge the U.S. Secretary of Transportation to visit H60 and to request immediate action to take place for improved road construction.

"I am pleading to Secretary Buttigieg on behalf of the community, children, and elders who rely

on H60 for both daily and emergency services to have this road paved," said Delegate Begay. "This issue is shared between the Navajo Nation and the Hopi Tribe, so I am asking for your consideration to act on behalf of your constituents to have this road paved."

Among those who attended the field tour was Ivan Sidney, Village Administrator for the First Mesa Consolidated Villages of the Hopi Tribe, and Arlando Teller, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Tribal Affairs at the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Both tribal leaders expressed how impassable H60 has become due to

the heavy rainfall that the region has been experiencing. School buses and emergency vehicles are unable to serve residents from Low Mountain and Polacca due to flooding and washed-out roads.

Overlooking washed-out parts of the road, both Delegate Begay and Mr. Sidney recorded a video for U.S. Secretary of Transportation, Pete Buttigieg, discussing how both tribes have been stuck in the bureaucracy of state and federal policies. Thus, no new progress has been made on paving or addressing the issue.

"Although there have been attempts of paving H60 on a tribal level, both the Hopi Tribe and

Navajo Nation need support on a congressional level due to the many jurisdictions that are within this single road," said Delegate Begay.

Mr. Sidney spoke on how many Hopi and Navajo residents living in the area are disproportionately impacted due to H60 being the only road to emergency services.

Additionally, he included that throughout his years in public service, H60 has yet to be paved.

"In the past, both tribal governments were able to effectively work together on different road projects, however, with the change in politics over time, we are finding ourselves needing help from the federal govern-

ment," said Mr. Sidney. "However, I am willing to put as much effort and resources needed to see this road be paved before I retire from politics."

Delegate Begay and Mr. Sidney, along with the help from Mr. Teller will continue their efforts in effectively lobbying for the paving of H60 this coming fall. ###
