To date, Summit Construction has installed over 300 new automatic read water meters on this project, out of a total of over 500 meters.

One of the challenges with this project is locating waterlines that do not have markers, and for which the utility mapping is incorrect.

You may see the contractor potholing for waterlines around the village. There are a few large meters on this project that will be installed in pre-cast concrete vault. Those have been delivered and are being stored for now.

The HAMP construction has reached Polacca. A 10-inch PVC wa-

terline is being installed from Polacca West Tank all the way down Highway 264 to a point just west of the Circle M and then will connect to the existing waterline that fills the east tank. Two tanks are under construction as well as three buildings which will house booster pump stations and wellhead piping.

First Mesa Elementary School News

This year the First Mesa Elementary School (FMES) Indian Day was recognized on Sept. 24. It was held in the school for students only. A special program was planned towards generating cultural awareness and encouraging cultural learning.

FMES Board members are Anthony Dukepoo, President; Mackensi Navenma, Vice President; Keesha Talayumptewa, Member; Dione Naha, Member; and Romalita Laban, Member. The school board meets the first Wednesday of each month

but may call special school board meetings to conduct business.

The Parents in Education (PIE) committee conducts their meetings on-line through Zoom. Two meetings have already been held with the next meeting scheduled for Oct. 4.

Our newly appointed PIE officers are Judy Youvella, President; Angie Lowe, Vice-President; Nathania Silas, Secretary; and Dorothy Sulu, Treasurer. After each PIE meeting, the class with the most parents signing into the meeting are rewarded with an ice cream sundae party. Pamela Namingha is the school's new Parent Liaison.

FMES has updated its health safety policy and procedures for the school. The revised procedures is to address the current Covid pandemic situation and to ensure the safety of our students and staff. This guides us for protective measures. First,

we have a mask mandate in the school for everyone. A temperature check is conducted of everyone before being allowed into the school. If any of the virus symptoms are present the person is not allowed into the school and sent home. Depending upon the symptoms, a virus test may be recommended.

Extensive sanitation cleaning is conducted every other Friday within the school. On a daily basis staff will clean their work area. Teachers conduct sanitizing cleaning of student desks and classroom equipment. During lunch time, seating is spaced six (6) feet apart between students. We do not allow general visitors into the school at this time. If you have any questions you are welcome to call the school. We encourage respecting each other's safety.

FMES has a few positions open yet to be filled. They are: Special Education Teacher, School Counselor, Hopi Lavayi/Culture Teacher, Teacher Assistants, Custodian/Grounds Keeper and Student Health Aide/Bus Monitor. HOPi TRIBAL COUNCIL REPORT

This report is in reference to the BIA Police Contract document that was finally received during a Tribal Council session on Sept. 20 when the Council entertained Action Item: *Mutual Aid Agreements with the Arizona DPS, Navajo County and Navajo Nation Police.*

Knowing these legislative matters were scheduled and having received numerous complaints on the Hopi Tribal Police, these documents were requested months ago with no response.

It is not surprising that long time members of the Tribal Council never received copies of the final contract (the contract is nearly two years old). I requested a copy from the General Counsel's Office (in house attorneys) and also faced continued delays.

During the Sept. 20 Session, Kykotsmovi Rep. Phillip Quooytewa voiced his disappointment that his request to the Tribal Secretary's Office did not result in a reply. The Tribal Secretary responded that her office did not have a copy of the Police Contract. After her statement, Council members instantly, received an email with contract documents attached. It is almost as though this document was purposely withheld from the Tribal Council.

Public Law 93-638 allows the Hopi Tribal Council to contract the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Justice Services (Police).

Hopi Tribal Council Resolution H-039-2017 during Chairman Herman Honanie's leadership, was approved by a vote of 16 in favor and 5 opposed to notify the BIA of the intent to contract the BIA Police.

Hopi Tribal Council Resolution H-065-2018 dated August 09, 2018 was approved 13 in favor and 1 opposed with Chairman Timothy Nuvangyaoma presiding, included the following: *"that the Hopi Tribal Chairman or his designee is hereby authorized and directed to negotiate, execute and deliver any and all agreements, consents, contracts or other documents thereof, and to take such further actions on behalf of the Hopi Tribe as may be necessary or desirable to full fill the intent of this resolution".*

Tribal Council Resolution H-065-2019 also included *"Hopi Tribal Council via Hopi Tribal Resolution H-039-2017, supports capacity building of a self-sustaining Hopi Law Enforcement entity by increasing resources and contracting through Public*

Law 93-638, as amended, the BIA Law Enforcement programs (uniformed police, criminal investigations, administration and dispatch) to make law enforcement a part of the Hopi Tribal governance, to strengthen self-governance, assert tribal control and accountability".

Where are the feasibility studies and accountability to support the contract to improve police services in our villages? Included in the contract documents is *to operate a model professional police department (Hopi Resource Enforcement Services) that is responsive to the community on a 24-hour basis.* It further states that the *"54 Officer Police Force" will be sworn to uphold the Hopi Tribal Constitution and enforce the Hopi Code and additional Tribal Ordinances.*

So where are the 54 Police Officers? It was reported that only eleven (11) Police Officers are currently employed, along with eight (8) Police Supervisors.

Further, all sworn officers, will also be holders of BIA-OJS Special Law Enforcement Commissions in accordance to Hopi Tribal Resolution (H-046-2012). "As certified Federal, State and Tribally Commissioned Officers, officers will also be authorized to enforce applicable Federal, State and tribal laws against Indians and non-Indians equivalently. Through appropriate jurisdiction, officers will testify in Federal, State and Tribal Courts to bring chosen charges to justice".

It was reported that to date, only six (6) Police Officers have applied for the Federal Commissions. So, in essence, our Tribal Police have no Federal Authority.

These Federal Commissions are vital to provide protection to the Tribal Police Officers in liability issues.

For example, Navajo Tribal Police are state and BIA commissioned which provides coverage under the Federal Tort Claims. Families of Navajo Officers killed in line of duty are provided compensation coverage under the Federal Tort Claims. The questioning of liability was purposely avoided by the presenters.

Included was implementation of community policing and the department will be required to assist with solving community problems, "not just react to call for services".

Also, crime prevention through proactive policing will be stressed and special emphasis placed on youth

and working with schools. These are only some of the services promised to contract the BIA Police.

Question to the people? Are these promises occurring and whose responsibility is to demand the services?

During the presentation, the Chief of Police remarked that his office never received complaints on police services so he was not aware of any complaints. Chief Pinto, formerly a Chief Ranger—laterally became the Hopi Police Chief. This position should have been advertised to seek a true Law Enforcement Administrator.

The Hopi Tribal Council Law and Order Committee by resolution is authorized the responsibility to oversee the operations of Hopi Tribal Justice Services; including the oversight of Law Enforcement Operations and Investigations of Complaints against the Police.

Of importance is the evaluations of the Police Services including the contractual compliance of the BIA Police contract.

Today, we are engaged in Mutual Assistance Agreements with outside agencies without having factual knowledge what our police services are doing in our communities.

Past and current members disagree that these Agreements meet the approvals of the full committee. Only voice comments were stated in council with no factual documents of the actions of the Law & Order Committee.

It is my perception that Hopi Law Enforcement is now using these agreements to bring in outside Law Enforcement to supplement its shortfalls. This is occurring without input from the villages and asking their positions on outside Law Enforcement in their villages.

To further seek the input of the villages, I took the position to make a motion to refer these matters back to the Law & Order Committee. I immediately faced direct opposition from the Tribal Chairman who was adamantly seeking approvals.

Kykotsmovi Rep. Herman Honanie made the motion to approve and was seconded by First Mesa Rep. Dale Siquah. The four opposing votes included A.T. Siquah and myself.

Our position was not to oppose the concept of Mutual Aid but to first evaluate our Police Services and receive input from our people.

It is further my opinion that the Chairman and Administration is strong arming legislation through Tribal Council. The Tribal

FMCV Water Operations Engage in Lead and Copper Testing of Residential Tap water

Recently, the FMCV water operations engaged in testing for lead and copper in residential units.

Residents were randomly selected and asked to participate in the lead/copper water samples from their tap water.

Participants agreed and were required to fill a bottle of tap water early in the morning before anyone used the water.

Water Operators Joshua Huma and Keon Adams received training on how to collect the samples and how to fill out the required forms from Water Supervisor Alfonso Sakeva, Jr.

Huma and Adams took the water samples to Holbrook, AZ for testing

and are currently awaiting test results.

Upon receipt, each participant will be mailed a copy of the results of their water test samples.

According to the Compliance Agreement with the EPA (Environmental Protection Agency), the FMCV (First Mesa Consolidated Villages) is also required to submit quarterly water samples to test for arsenic and other contaminants in the Polacca Water System.

The improved water system—HAMP construction—has now reached the First Mesa Polacca area, and it won't be long before the new water will be running throughout the community.

Council for its own reasons has been reluctant to inform the Chairman he lacks Executive Authority and that the Hopi Constitution only provides the Tribal Council with full authority and designates the Chairman as a Presiding Officer.

What is also of concern is the General Counsel not requesting permission and authority from the Hopi Tribal Council which it represents. The use of Executive Authority has also put the Tribal Council in position with the Hopi Ranchers on the force reduction of livestock.

Also complicating the lack of police services is no adequate detention facility. For apparent reason, the Hopi Tribe did not contract the Detention Services and today remains a federal responsibility.

This is interesting since having a Tribal Police Program with lack of federal authority; thereby, enforcing only tribal laws, the arrested individuals are tribal

prisoners. Should there be an agreement between the BIA and Hopi Tribe. This again is to provide an unquestionable liability position for the protection of the tribe, BIA and the tribal inmate.

With lack of a facility, violators are released to walk the villages. Information was recently released by the Tribal Chairman of plans for a new Detention. Again, not all Tribal Council Representatives are aware of this development.

The Police contract documents are available online at: firstmesaconsolidatedvillages.com under Resolutions, Exec orders, Declarations.

It appears these services are lacking because villages are not actively voicing their concerns, complaints and/or being victims of crime. Our Traditional Leaders have been voicing their concern on lack of adequate Police Services and their complaints, have had no response.

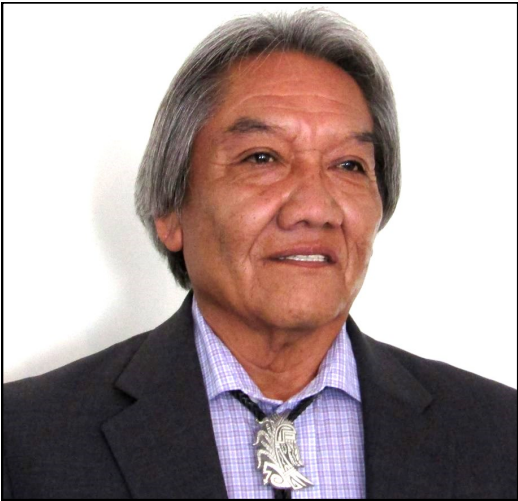

U.S. Department of the Interior Internship Program provides students from high school to graduate-level school a paid opportunity to work for a Federal agency of the U.S. government. Their work will allow them to explore Federal careers while still in school and while getting paid for the work performed.

Many students who successfully complete the internship program may be eligible for a permanent job in the civil service after graduation. Eligible students include high school seniors planning to attend a 4-year college or university, community or junior college, or professional, technical, vocational, and trade school. Students pursuing advanced degree programs are also eligible to apply.

Internships are part-time or full-time and can last up to one year or for an indefinite period of time. Students may choose an internship that aligns with their career goals or field of study. After 120 days of completing the internship program, interns may be eligible to convert to a permanent position.

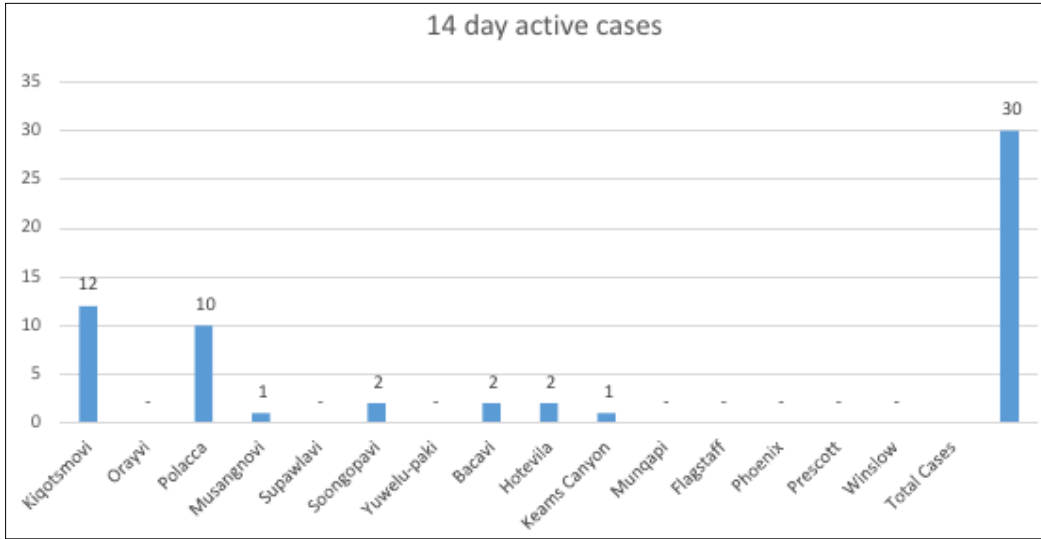

To date, the Hopi Health Care Center (HHCC) has tested over 11,076 patients for the coronavirus. Over 1,501 of those tested at HHCC came back positive with 1,091 from Hopi Tribal members. The Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation reported 292 positives for Hopi Villages with a combined number of 1,393*** positive Hopi Tribal members.

Over 1,075 million confirmed positive cases now exist in Arizona. Of those, close to 19,440 are in Navajo and 21,015 in Coconino Counties. As of September 23, 2021 the U.S. now has approximately 42,363 million confirmed positive cases with over 667,086 deaths reported.



This graph demonstrates the active cases and is stratified by village. Currently there are 30 active cases that are defined as persons that have had a positive test result or symptom onset in the last 14 days.

In this graph, the Total cases bar is all villages combined and should be excluded from the remainder of the graph. This graph is useful in isolating where the virus is most active at the current moment.

PREVENTION

Watch for Symptoms - people with COVID-19 have had a wide range of symptoms reported – ranging from mild symptoms to severe illness. Symptoms may appear 2-10 days after exposure to the virus. Anyone can have mild to severe symptoms. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches
- Headache

- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

This list does not include all possible symptoms. CDC will continue to update this list as we learn more about

COVID-19. Older adults and people who have severe underlying medical conditions like heart or lung disease or diabetes seem to be at higher risk for developing more serious complications from COVID-19 illness.

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COVID-19 Vaccine Booster Shot CDC Statement on ACIP Booster Recommendations

Today, CDC Director Rochelle P. Walensky, M.D., M.P.H., endorsed the CDC Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices' (ACIP) recommendation for a booster shot of the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine in certain populations and also recommended a booster dose for those in high risk occupational and institutional settings. The Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) authorization and CDC's guidance for use are important steps forward as we work to stay ahead of the virus and keep Americans safe.

protection. With the Delta variant's dominance as the circulating strain and cases of COVID-19 increasing significantly across the United States, a booster shot will help strengthen protection against severe disease in those populations who are at high-risk for exposure to COVID-19 or the complications from severe disease. CDC will continue to monitor the safety and effectiveness of COVID-19 vaccines to ensure appropriate recommendations to keep all Americans safe. We will also evaluate with similar urgency available data in the coming weeks to swiftly make additional recommendations for other populations or people who got the Moderna or Johnson & Johnson vaccines.

This updated interim guidance from CDC allows for millions of Americans who are at highest risk for COVID-19 to receive a Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 booster shot to help increase their protection.

The following is attributable to Dr Walensky: As CDC Director, it is my job to recognize where our actions can have the greatest impact. At CDC, we are tasked with analyzing complex, often imperfect data to make concrete recommendations that optimize health. In a pandemic, even with uncertainty, we must take actions that we anticipate will do the greatest good.

- CDC recommends:
- people 65 years and older and residents in long-term care settings should receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series,
 - people aged 50–64 years with underlying medical conditions should receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series,
 - people aged 18–49 years with underlying medical conditions may receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series, based on their individual benefits and risks, and
 - people aged 18-64 years who are at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission because of occupational or institutional setting **may** receive a booster shot of Pfizer-BioNTech's COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after their Pfizer-BioNTech primary series, based on their individual benefits and risks.

I believe we can best serve the nation's public health needs by providing booster doses for the elderly, those in long-term care facilities, people with underlying medical conditions, and for adults at high risk of disease from occupational and institutional exposures to COVID-19. This aligns with the FDA's booster authorization and makes these groups eligible for a booster shot. Today, ACIP only reviewed data for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. We will address, with the same sense of urgency, recommendations for the Moderna and J&J vaccines as soon as those data are available.

Many of the people who are now eligible to receive a booster shot received their initial vaccine early in the vaccination program and will benefit from additional

While today's action was an initial step related to booster shots, it will not distract from our most important focus of primary vaccination in the United States and around the world. I want to thank ACIP for their thoughtful discussion and scientific deliberation on the current data which informed my recommendation.

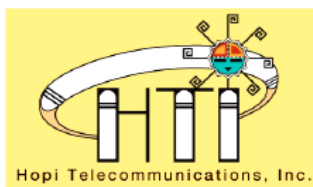
