



# **U.S. Department of the Interior Internship Program**



U.S. Department of the Interior Internship Program provides students from high school to graduate-level school a paid opportunity to work for a Federal agency of the U.S. government. Their work will allow them to explore Federal careers while still in school and while getting paid for the work performed.

Many students who successfully complete the internship program may be eligible for a permanent job in the civil service after graduation. Eligible students include high school seniors planning to attend a 4-year college or university, community or junior college, or professional, technical, vocational, and trade school. Students pursuing advanced degree programs are also eligible to apply.

Internships are part-time or full-time and can last up to one year or for an indefinite period of time. Students may choose an internship that aligns with their career goals or field of study. After 120 days of completing the internship program, interns may be eligible to convert to a permanent position.

The U.S. Department of the Interior is responsible for protecting America's natural resources and heritage. Among its duties are regulation of territorial governments, management of hospitals and universities, management of public parks, and protection for Indians, public lands, patents, and pensions.





To date, the Hopi Health Care Center for the coronavirus. Over 1,501 of those tested at HHCC came back positive with 1,091 from Hopi Tribal members. The Tuba City Regional Health Care Corporation reported 292 positives for Hopi Villages with a combined number of 1,393\*\*\* positive Hopi Tribal members.

Over 1,075 million confirmed positive cases now exist in Arizona. Of those, close to 19,440 are in Navajo and 21,015 in Coconino Counties. As of September 23, 2021 the U.S. now has approximately 42,363 million confirmed positive cases with over 667,086 deaths reported.

The following is attributable to Dr Walensky: As CDC Director, it is my job to recog-

nize where our actions can have the greatto make concrete recommendations that optimize health. In a pandemic, even with uncertainty, we must take actions that we anticipate will do the greatest good. I believe we can best serve the nation's public health needs by providing booster doses for the elderly, those in long-term care facilities, people with underlying medical conditions, and for adults at high risk of disease from occupational and institutional exposures to COVID-19. This aligns with the FDA's booster authorization and makes these groups eligible for a booster shot. Today, ACIP only reviewed data for the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine. We will address, with the same sense of urgency, recommendations for the Moderna and J&J vaccines as soon as those data are available. While today's action was an initial step related to booster shots, it will not distract from our most important focus of primary vaccination in the United States and around the world. I want to thank ACIP for their thoughtful discussion and scientific deliberation on the current data which informed my recommendation.


