The reason why I play the sport of football is for my people and to give them inspiration and someone to look up to that will inspire them to be greater.

In a community that doesn't have much, I want to give back to my people something. Being selected for the Indigenous Bowl is a good start towards giving them something back and showing them that these opportunities are possible coming from a reservation that does not have much. Especially now, in the world that we live in today, people need someone to look up to. I hope to be a role model for my peers and for younger children as they begin to experience sports.

Football is something big that is growing out on the Hopi reservation.

During the summertime, there are flag football games that have recently started up. I want to help expand football into the community and share my experience of what the sport has provided to me. It's more than just a game, it has given me opportunities that involve furthering my education and doing something I love at the same time. It gave a way to express myself and put my name out there and, most importantly, it gave me a brotherhood and family with my teammates due to the hard work and struggles that we've been through together.

As you can see, it means a lot to me and is more than just a game. I have grown up around the sport of football for many years. I was inspired to play football by watching my older brother play the sport. Just seeing the moves he would make on the field and that swift adrenaline rush I would feel when a big play would happen made me fall in love with

the game. I began my football journey as a little kid when I would go out with my father and brother to go practice football. I always remember not knowing much about the sport and was just a little chubby kid who had dreams of making it big in the sport of football and now to see the knowledge of the game that I have learned is truly remarkable.

I now think of the game as a lifestyle which has grown into a part of me. What football means to me is that it has taught me many principles of life such as discipline, leadership, and respect. The Indigenous Bowl is the premier event for the 7G Foundation to further the goal of molding the next 7 generations of Native leaders through education, athletics, culture and real-world support. The first Indigenous Bowl was played in 2017. The Bowl is open to High School Seniors of American Indian descent who have not yet enrolled full-time in college. The event is an opportunity for young, Native athletes to showcase their talent on the football field, work with coaches and mentors, and develop the skills necessary to move to the next level of competition.

First Mesa Consolidated Villages Remains a Traditional Self-Government

A recent meeting of the First Mesa Consolidated Villages’ (FMCV) Emergency Task Team and FMCV Hopi Tribal Council Representatives was requested by Council Representative Delfred Leslie, who was recently certified by our Kikmongwi to serve on the Hopi Tribal Council. His primary purpose was to hear from our three Momngwit, serving according to the dictates of their religious and ceremonial deities (Tiponis), the definition of consolidated villages.

It remains in our written history that an agreement was reached at the time of the writing of the Constitutional and By-laws of the Hopi Tribe that our village will be a consolidation (Walpi, Sichomovi, and Tewa) under a traditional self-government with the Walpi Kikmongwi as our leader. Since the Federal Government adopted this Constitution in 1936, our village became a member of the newly established Hopi Tribal Council. Already in the beginning, the traditional self-government was being challenged by some of our village members attempting to include intrusions of the modern Anglo political government, such as elections, confrontations with our religious leaders, voicing people’s rights, etc. It was already obvious we did not know traditional teachings to have understandings of the purposes and authorities of our leaders.

This led to a political group at our village

to form the “People’s Rights” group to force an election for a village constitution to overthrow our self-government under the Kikmongwi. The Kikmongwi at the time took this action to the Federal Court onto the Hopi Appellant Court resulting in a historical ruling upholding the authorities of the Kikmongwi under the self-government. However, this ruling to uphold our consolidation did not cease our village separations.

Village members politically persuaded the Hopi Tribal Council to separate the years of a joint FMCV village allocation into three separate village allocations. According to this separate allocation and to abide by the Council’s appropriation language, Board of Directors were created to receive the fundings. During the separations, our Kikmongwi and leaders had no participation. A filing of a “Certified Question” by some members of the Hopi Tribal Council on this separation of allocation was again taken before the Hopi Appellant Court resulting in another ruling upholding the separated allocation but held the FMCV consolidated self-government under the Leadership of the Kikmongwi.

This political predicament has continued to the advantage of tribal political leaders, such as the Tribal Chairman gaining political support. This continuation is to the advantage of the destruction of our self-government and has resulted in the Tribal

Council’s violations of village authority over lands supported by Tribal Legal Counsel. The non-recognition of FMCV has especially been escalated by this administration for the past six years. Although the use of FMCV lands have benefited the entire Hopi Villages, this non-support and political squandering is continuing with no attempts by the Hopi Tribal Council to initiate legislative corrective actions.

This is what I believe to be the purpose of a meeting with our Traditional leaders to gain further understanding of their responsibilities of the FMCV Tribal Council Representatives and especially including their expectations. What are our understandings of a consolidation? Non-actions to stand up for our village government is allowing for the destruction of what remains our true Hopi government.

In closing, we will soon again witness our participation in reverence to our Soyal Ceremony and upcoming winter solstice ceremonies. This is to exercise our connection and belief in our Hopi Religion. Yet soon after, we all go our separate ways and display our disagreements and opinions in disharmony. Our Soyal Ceremony is prepared with thoughts and prayers for unity and long healthy lives. This includes forging the future of our people, especially our children today and those to come.

Hopi Tribal Council Report

Deciding important matters concerning the lives of everyone including First Mesa people in Polacca, Arizona is what we do. This duty appears to be the bulk of the work Tribal Council representative do.

Numerous matters referred to as Action Items, call on Tribal Council representatives following thorough discussions of each Action Item then we vote up or down on it, based upon whether each Action Item will benefit the Hopi Tribe.

Action Items during the past three months have included water issues, Tribal investment matters, the development and progress of the Hopi Tribes- H-13, General Fund budget, economic development, major program; department

purchases to promote work efficiency, Hopi Tribal Prosecutor and Hopi Tribal Election registrar appointments, Inter Governmental Agreements, Memorandums of Agreements between the Hopi Tribe and outside contractors who will provide services to the Hopi Tribe, enrollment matters and many other significant and important matters to promote the general welfare of Hopis and others who reside on Hopi.

Monthly reports to the Tribal Council are presented from Hopi Tribal Council, Standing Committees, and others such as the Hopi Judicial, Law Enforcement on a monthly basis.

Hopi Tribal Council, Investment Oversight Standing Committee, Transportation Task Team and Audit Team Report

Hopi Tribal Council:

- Action Item #107-2023: To appoint Norma Claussen’s Attorney Employment Contract and appointment as Chief Prosecutor. The Hopi Tribal Council approved the action item as this was a very urgent matter.
- Mr. Alfred Lomaquahu: Letter of Interest for the position of the Hopi Tribal Elections Registrar for discussion and possible action. Lomaquahu was appointed by the Hopi Tribal Council and we welcome him in his new role.
- Action Item #101-2023: Approval of Hopi Tribe Office of General Counsel to represent the Hopi Board of Education in appeal of the Bureau of Indian Education’s denial of P.L. 100-297 Grant. The Hopi Tribal Council passed the action item by a vote of 9-7-2. In reviewing the action item, it is not a certainty that the Office of General Counsel will not encounter a conflict, however it may be unlikely. Unless it is certain that there will be no conflict, I, along with other Representatives believe the decision of OGC to represent HBE is questionable. My suggestion to the Hopi Board of Education was to hire a separate attorney to represent the HBE.

Investment Oversight Standing Committee:

- Four members (Representatives) of the committee were present. We were not able to attain a quorum.
- Chair Youvella, Jr. did take the time thank the attending members for

their work, participation and commitment to the IOSC.

◇ It was noted that we had many successes in FY 2023. We revisited the Hopi Tribe’s Investment Policy and with the help of Rockefeller, we amended the policy to better fit the ever changing financial world. We are also on pace to attain nearly \$9 million in yields from Tribal Investments, and we’d like to thank Treasurer Talayumptewa for her part in this success. We attended a work session with Rockefeller to help IOSC members better understand the world of finance and marketing.

Transportation Task Team:

- Regarding the Right Of Way (ROW) processing and numerous delays on new road construction, it was reported by Mr. Michael Lomayaktewa (HDOT Director)– In a meeting with the Western Region Office, “it was expressed to Hopi Agency that these are BIA Transportation projects and not Tribal projects which have gone through the Federal NEPA processing these requirements now meet conditions and necessary corrections as needed and when all are satisfied with issuance of a Finding Of No Significant Impact (FONSI) signed off by the Superintendent, this is complete that there is no additional level nor layer of bureaucratic processing. These now move forward to construction once ROW is granted by the Tribe and unto the

Federal Agency for approval granting of Right-of-Way as this remains an inherent function of the Secretary. There should be further review by Realty or other. So, the HIR 60 Upper Polacca Road (Low Mountain Road) and others should proceed that have met criteria and review in its project development.”

- Kachina Point Road (Leupp Road) is being prepared to move toward construction – funds being evaluated and the project is on the Regional Priority Project List through NACOG and the State appropriation process. The Transportation Task Team and HDOT will be advocating through NACOG and State Representatives/Senators to gain more funding.
- HIR 10, Spider Springs Road, current design was near completion however impact by HUC/HAMP design will need further evaluating along with need for Right of Way, funding is being evaluated to move towards construction. It needs to be noted that with the rapid rise in inflation, the cost of new construction has gone beyond the initial projections.
- Spider Mound Road, lacks design and construction funding at this time.
- Hopi Jr./Sr. High School Road lacks design and construction funding at this time.
- The Hopi Department of Transportation, along with assistance from the Transportation Task Team and the Office of General Counsel are seeking for HDOT to gain Regulated Entity Status. At this time, research

is being conducted to assess the feasibility of such an endeavor.

- In a joint effort between HDOT and the Navajo County Transportation Dept., 15 loads of aggregate were delivered to Polacca. It is hopeful that this aggregate will help to alleviate the dire road conditions encountered during inclement weather on HIR 10. This is only a short term remedy and if successful for the winter, can lead to more partnerships with Navajo County.
- At the end of the meeting, the Transportation Task Team thanked Chair Honanie for his leadership and guidance of the TTT for the past year.


Audit Team:

- The Audit Team authorized by Hopi Tribal Council to assist and help ensure that audits are completed, has met several times. The 2020 audit is on track to be completed by the end of Dec. 2023, as requested by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The Audit Team met with the auditing firm of Synder & Brown to express the urgent need to get the 2020 audit completed by the end of 2023.
- The team will also assist the Finance Department to ensure that the 2021 and 2022 audits are completed in FY 2024. It is imperative to complete at least two audits in the year 2024.

I would like to thank everyone for taking the time to read my report. Also, Happy Holidays and safe travels!

First Mesa Village & Community Meetings

The First Mesa Consolidated Villages (FMCV) held two public meetings to address geological hazards in First Mesa; specifically the villages of Walpi, Sichomovi and Tewa & surrounding areas and the Hopi Tribe Department of Transportation (HDOT) Indian Route 508.

The first meeting was held in Sichomovi at Ponsi Hall at 1:00 pm for residents of the mesa. There were 24 in attendance and the meeting lasted for a little over 2 hours.

The second meeting was held in Polacca at the Polacca Community Building at 6:00 pm. There were 30 in attendance and the meeting also lasted a little over 2 hours.

Members of the United States Geological Survey (USGS) were invited to present their preliminary findings of potential geological hazards. Mr. Stephen Slaughter, Associate Program Coordinator for Landslide Hazards of Golden Colorado and Mr. Ryan Crow, Research Geologist of Flagstaff Arizona were present to discuss their preliminary report. Other members of their team were unable to attend. (The site visit and preliminary assessment were conducted June 13, 2023. See previous issues of the Village Crier at firstmesaconsolidatedvillages.com)

The audience was asked to write comments, questions and suggestions and the responses would be forthcoming. Verbal comments, questions and suggestions were addressed during the meetings. Responses and detailed information will be published in the next issue of the Village Crier.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE— To provide a general welfare program that will provide financial support awards to enrolled individual tribal members over 18 years of age and families directly affected by the COVID-19 public health emergency and its after-effects. Assistance provided under this program shall not be considered compensation for services or earned income.

In continuing the program that was established on September 16, 2020, the Hopi Tribe recognizes that individual members and families of the Tribe were disproportionately impacted by the pandemic, including, without limitation: social distancing requirements; reduced employment opportunities; reduced business income opportunities; increased cost of food and supplies; increased household costs and utilities; additional education and child care costs; burdens due to business and government service closures; the additional reliance on technology, phone and internet services; and the need for additional cleaning supplies and activities to meet CDC and other recommended guidelines. The Tribe further recognizes the direct impact and hardship on tribal culture, traditions and ceremonial gatherings.

This program is intended to promote the general welfare of the Tribe and its members by alleviating hardships endured due to COVID-19 through providing, without limitation:

- (1) Financial stabilization for tribal members and tribal families who are impacted by COVID-19 and have experienced or continue to experience a loss of income and/or additional household expenses due to COVID-19;
- (2) Food security;
- (3) Continued education;
- (4) Assistance with childcare services;
- (5) Assistance with medical and health services; and
- (6) Assistance with unreimbursed, reasonable and necessary personal, living, family and other unplanned expenses incurred due to the COVID-19 disaster and its ongoing effects on the community.

II. STANDARDS— Enrolled Tribal Members seeking assistance under the State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF) General Welfare Assistance Program (GWEAP) entitled: HOPI Pandemic Recovery shall apply on a form specified by the Tribal Administration that is de-

signed to demonstrate the unique COVID-19-related needs of each applicant.

III. QUALIFICATIONS—

To be eligible for a GWEAP award, the person must:

- (1) Be an enrolled Hopi Tribal Member as of July 31, 2023;
- (2) Be at least 18 years of age as of July 31, 2023;
- (3) Live in the United States of America; and
- (4) Apply for assistance based on need specifically related to COVID-19, with the burden of proof to establish need warranting participation in the SLFRF General Welfare Assistance Program resting on the applicant.

IV. APPLICATION PROCESS—

Each applicant shall provide the following information:

1. * Date of Application;
2. * Name of Applicant;
3. * Primary Phone Number (s);
4. Message Phone Number;
5. * Mailing Address;
6. Email Address;
7. * Tribal Enrollment Number;
8. * Attestation of economic impact due to COVID-19.

* Asterisk indicates a required field.

V. COVID-19-RELATED ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS—

(1) Tribal Families Support. Provides assistance to eligible tribal members to offset childcare, medical and health care costs related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Also provides assistance to any eligible adult tribal member who has been impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic for utility payments, food/groceries, and cleaning and disinfecting supplies.

(a) Amount of Award- each adult member of a household will receive \$2,000.00 for necessary household expenses as defined above that are incurred due to COVID-19.

VI. APPLICATIONS FOR SLFRF GWEAP—

Participation Applications: To participate in GWEAP, an Applicant shall first submit an Application using the electronic portal or forms provided by the Tribe.

- Applications for the SLFRF Program may also be submitted to the Tribe by mailing or dropping off the Applications to the following

c/o GWEAP, Kykotsmovi, AZ 86039 Drop-off: Hopi Tribal Administration Bldg, One Main Street c/o GWEAP, Kykotsmovi, AZ 86039 Applications must be submitted to the HTPRC Administration no later than March 1, 2024 or until funding has been exhausted, whichever comes first.

VII. NOTIFICATION—

Applicants will be notified within three (3) business days if their application is administratively incomplete. Applicants who apply electronically using the secure portal will have online visibility to the review and approval status of their applications.

VIII. REPORTING—

Applicants will be required to sign the application to certify the accuracy of the information provided. If a particular assistance award is structured as a reimbursement program, applicants must provide documentation of expenses prior to the receipt of any funds.

IX. RELEASE OF INFORMATION—

Except as needed to facilitate application processing, Tribal employees are not authorized to provide other individuals the status of an application for a member unless a signed release of information has been provided with authorized individuals.

X. FORFEITURE OF AWARD—

The Tribe will make its best efforts to ensure awardees receive any award made.

- (1) All awards processed will be sent via a check to the awardee at the address listed on the W-9 form.
- (2) If the check is returned to the Tribe, the Tribe will attempt to contact the awardee to reissue the check.
- (3) If the Tribe is unable to contact the awardee, or awardee does not respond after 90 days after the check has been issued the award is considered forfeited, and no further action is necessary.
- (4) After contact has been made with the awardee, the Tribe will reissue the check one additional time.
- (5) If the check is returned to the Tribe for the second time, the award is considered forfeited, and no further action is necessary.
- (6) If an awardee fails to redeem the check within 90 days of the date issued on the check, the award is considered forfeited.
